WILBERFORCE — Wilberforce University pulled off a major upset this week, defeating Walsh by a score of 82-77 in an AMC game Tuesday evening.

The win was the Bulldogs' (8-14, 4-2) first win over the Cavaliers (17-4, 6-2) in 15 meetings and fourth overall in the 22 games between the two schools.

The two teams battled back and forth with Walsh forcing the overtime period after Ryan Vanderhorst hit a three to notch the score at 70-70. The score was also tied at halftime 34-34.

For Wilberforce, Chris Olafioye had 16 points and 10 rebounds, Darius Foster poured in 24 points, Ronald Hightower added 12 points and 10 boards, Lendyn Davis, 11 points and Terrance Morgan put in 11 points.

Ron Kinney led the Cavaliers with a double-double performance as he scored 19 points and pulled down 12 boards. Rian Burrell added 16 points and L.J. Sutton scored 14 points.

The Bulldogs out-rebounded Wlash 50-42. Neither team led by more than seven points during the contest.

"As long as we play hard, and play tough defense we will give ourselves a chance to win," said Wilberforce head coach Terry Futrell. "It's going to be like this. Every game is going to be tough but we made a big step knocking off the top team in Walsh."

Futrell has made great strides in his first year at the helm for Wilberforce. Tuesday's win was a great milestone for the rebuilding program.

"This was a great team win.
Everyone contributed to this victory,"
Futrell said, "We told the seniors they had an opportunity to change our fortunes versus Walsh and they showed great heart in achieving that goal."

Wilberforce fell apart offensively and defensively and fell to Point Park University Tuesday evening by a count of 88-71 in American Mideast Conference play.

Point Park (10-9, 3-4 AMC) had lost its last two conference games, but ran out to an 18-point halftime lead to avenge an earlier loss to Wilberforce (9-16, 5-3 AMC). Point Park, which had been 3-6 in its last nine games entering Tuesday, took complete control with a 52-34 halftime lead over the Bulldogs.

Wilberforce split the season series with Point Park as they won the earlier contest 92-80.

Terrance Morgan had a team-high 14 points, with 12 of those coming on four 3-pointers in the first half for the Bulldogs. Darious Foster added a double-double with 10 points and 10 rebounds followed by Yann Sani's 11.

For the Pioneers, Asa Braxton had 16 of his 23 points in the first half and T.J. Heatherington finished with 22 points.

Wilberforce head coach Terry Futrell felt coming into the game that his squad would take care of business and get a win. Afterwards, the loss left a feeling of disappointment.

"We let a golden opportunity slip away last night. We are a good basketball team when we defend and share the basketball. We did not do either of those well in last night's game," he said. "Our team has not been in this position before (in the conference) this late in the season. Our challenge as a coaching staff will be to get them to compete at a higher level of intensity that will be necessary to get to the next level."

Wilberforce will play Saturday against Daemen College. The women's game starts at 2 p.m. with the men tipping at 4 p.m.

Wilberforce picked up a huge American Mideast Conference win over the weekend, as the Bulldogs defeated the Daemen Wildcats 68-58.

The loss snapped Daemen's five-game winning streak and dropped the Wildcats to 16-10, AMC). Wilderforce improved to (10-16, 6-3 AMC), and maintained a grasp on second in the conference standings.

Darius Foster led the way for the Bulldogs with a gamehigh 20 points. Chris Olafioye added 14 points and nine rebounds. SALEM, West Va. — Central State got a big game from and overpowered Salem International on the road by a count of 91-72 last night.

Greg Rice poured in 28 points to move Central State to a 14-7 record while the Tigers are now 5-16 on the season.

Central State took the lead from the get go and never looked back, starting the game on a 21-8 run. Salem International cut the lead to just seven points twice in the first half, before going into the break down by nine, 48-39.

The Marauders shot 60 percent (20-for-33) from the field in the first half. Salem was held to 38 percent (14-for-36) shooting from the field, but shot 9-for-17 from beyond the arc.


Salem had three players score in double figures led by Porter's team-high 19 points on 7-for-16 shooting, including 5-for-9 from three and a game-high seven assists.

Wilberforce falls to Walsh

CANTON — Wilberforce defeated Walsh (22-5, 10-2) earlier this season, but was on the other end of the score as the Cavs captured at least a share of the American Mideast Conference championship with an 84-45 victory over the Bulldogs (11-18, 7-4) Friday night.

Walsh trailed just once last night, at 3-2, in the game's first minute. The Cavs roared out to a 47-21 halftime lead and were never challenged in the second half, and led by as many as 45 points (71-26) with 9:56 to play.

Terrance Morgan led Wilberforce with 13 points. The Bulldogs were playing without injured starters Chris Olafioye and Ron Hightower. Ron Kinney led Walsh with a game-high 17 points.

"Going into this game, we were faced with the dilemma of playing or resting our team captain (Ronald Hightower) who is also our starting forward. A win would have given us the chance to share a piece of the conference title if Daemen College lost to Point Park on Saturday, Walsh is eligible for the regular season championship, but is not eligible for post season play due to their pending move to NCAA Division II," Wilberforce head coach Terry Futrell said. "Our conference gets one bid to the National tournament this year and that is determined by the conference tournament, Ronald is nursing a high ankle sprain and we felt it was more important to have him available for the conference tournament. Playing at Walsh University is a daunting task on any occasion, but unfortunately, playing without two of our starters, we were unable to fill the void in the loss. I told the players after the game to forget this game and get their minds set on Saturday's game versus Roberts Wesleyan."

A win today will give Wilberforce give the right to host a conference semi-final on Tuesday. A loss today will mean the Bulldogs will have to travel to one of its conference opponents sites.

Today's game at Wilberforce will starts at 2 p.m. (women) and the (men) will play at 4 p.m.

Yellow Springs church honors African-American veterans

YELLOW SPRINGS — A local church recently celebrated Black History Month by recognizing several men who bravely served their country.


Central Chapel A.M.E. Church held a ceremony Sunday honoring African American war veterans, including those from World War II, with a special emphasis on the Tuskegee Airmen and the Montford Point Marines.

Among those being honored were Charles Feaster, the only known original Tuskegee Airman in the Greene County area, and Jonas Bender, the only Montford Point Marine in attendance. Also in attendance was Roland Windburn, State Representative of the 40th House District. The veterans were supported by family and friends at the ceremony.

Gregory Edmonds, a member of the Tuskegee Airmen, Inc., Ohio Memorial Chapter, began the ceremony by stating that the Montford Marines were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal in November of 2011, and the Tuskegee Airmen were awarded the same in 2007.

Feaster and Bender shared their stories of their time of service, as did Charles Benning. Theodore Jackson, and Orlando Brown, who served in the U.S. Army.

The Tuskegee Airman were determined young men who enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps to become America's first black military airmen. The first

aviation class in 1941 had 13 cadets. In 1942, five of the cadets earned their silver wings and became the first black military pilots. They were later led by Colonel Benjamin O. Davis, Jr. during World War II. Davis was the first black man to become a general in the Air Force.

Feaster shared that they were 18- and 19-year-old boys who

learned everything about an airplane in Illinois, where they went to school six days a week. After training he was on a ship, traveling seven days to Casablanca where he was trained by a man who was the AVG, and flew the same planes that were assigned in Canada against the Japanese.

"I was assigned to the 33rd fighter group and was shipped from Casablanca to Tunisia, which was a 30-day trip by truck," said Feaster. "Seeing the planes lined up, this is it, this was what we've gone through segregation, the whole thing for."

Feaster remembered Col. Davis being pretty tough.

"He insisted we had to shave and get haircuits to look clean and neat in order to create an image to all the other surrounding organizations," he said.

Feaster, who was a Red Tail Angel, stated that 66 pilots were killed in action before the Red Tails went up with them.

The Tuskegee Airmen flew 1,578 combat missions, were awarded three presidential citations, one legion of merit, one silver star, 150 distinguished flag crosses, 744 air medals and eight purple hearts.

The Montford Point Marines, according to Edmonds, were the last bastion of segregation.

"In 1942, President Roosevelt issued an order that we would be integrated into the Marine Corps," said Bender. "After the order, it took a year or more before the Marine Corps finally said 'We'll take them."

The Montford Marines, in 1942, were committed to join the Marines on a segregated basis, which meant that the 20,000 black men that served all served on a segregated basis.

"They tried to take us down and prove that blacks could not be Marines," Bender said. "Over 20,000 of us went through that training, took all the flack they were throwing at us, and emerged proud Marines."

For Bender, it all started at Camp Shelby in Hasburg, Miss. He then went through 10 weeks of training at Camp Legume in 1942, when it was mandated that African Americans were given the opportunity to be recruited into the Marine Corps.

"There were 20,000 of us who brought about the success of being integrated, and all of us are proud that we did the ground work it took to tear down the concept that blacks could not be Marine's," said Bender. "We have all the opportunities today that the Marine could hope for, including becoming a General."

Of the 20,000 that served, there are only 200 left who received the congressional gold medal.

The three men that served in the U.S. Army all spoke, and Jackson's grandson, Derick Jackson, spoke for him.

Reverend Timothy Liggins, pastor of the church stated that they are hoping to have another ceremony honoring African American veterans of the Korean War.

WILBERFORCE — For the first time in over 15 years, the Wilberforce University men's basketball team hosted an American Mideast Conference basketball game. The Bulldogs didn't squander the opportunity and blasted Point Park College by a score of 91-76.

Darius Foster exploded for 29 points and helped Wilberforce (13-18, 8-4 AMC) advance to the AMC championship game on Saturday at 4 p.m. against top-seeded Daemen College (19-10) in Amherst, New York. The teams will be playing for an automatic bid to the NAIA Division II National Tournament in Branson, Missouri.

The Bulldogs moved to (6-1) at home against AMC opponents after last night's win as Point Park was the only team to gain a victory there this season. Devon Alexander led the Pioneers with 28 points.

Wilberforce built a nice 42-33 advantage at intermission halftime, and surged out to a 68-57 lead with 7:41 to play. The Bulldogs extended

three minutes to play.

Just before halftime, the referees handed Point Park's head coach Bob Rager a technical foul for arguing a call. It looked as though one of the three officials signaled a second foul and ejection from the contest, but after a brief conference they allowed him to stay in the game for the second half.

The home crowd seemed unsure of how to handle the playoff atmosphere. At halftime, students heard a speech for university President Patricia Hardaway, who reminded students in attendance to register to vote this election year. As Point Park players emerged from locker room to warmup they were loudly booed for interrupting the president's speech.

"We haven't had a playoff game at home in over 15 years, so the students and everybody are just trying to figure it all out," said Wilberforce head coach Terry Futrell at halftime. "We just need to play well for another half and get ready to play for the title."

His Bulldogs did just that, but after suffering through a 5-23 campaign last season, the program's one-year turnaround has been amazing. Futrell took over for Geoff Warren at the beginning of this season.



Wilberforce basketball programs on the rise

WILBERFORCE — By nearly everyone's estimation, 2011-2012 was a great rebuilding season for the Wilberforce University men's basketball team.

For the first time in fifteen years, the Bulldogs entered the American Mideast Conference playoffs - and came within one win of qualifying for the NAIA National tournament - losing in the championship game to the top seed Daemen College on their home court. It was also the first time since the 1998-1999 Season that Wilberforce played host to a league playoff game - and the Bulldogs won that semi-final game at the Multiplex over Point Park University.

In recognition of the team's turnaround this year, Bulldogs head coach Terry Futrell was named Coach of the Year by the AMC. It's a great feather in the cap of Futrell, who is completing his first year as athletic director and men's basketball coach at Wilberforce. Futrell returned to the Bulldogs after spending 2008-2011 as an

assistant coach at Cedarville University. He was an assistant coach and recruiting director at Wilberforce from 2006-2009.

"This was a great turnaround year and we're excited about the future," Futrell said.

The AMC also recognized five student athletes from Wilberforce – three from the men's basketball team, and two from the women's program.

The men include: Darius Foster, a six-three senior from Richmond, CA. The team captain was selected 1st Team All Conference. Foster averaged 16.2 points per game and shot 38.5 percent from the three point line and 83 percent from free throw line.

Christopher Olafioye, a sixfour senior from Detroit, MI was also recognized by being selected 2nd Team All Conference. Chris averaged 15.8 points per game and five rebounds per game.

Ronald Hightower, a sixthree senior from Dothan, AL, and team captain was also honored by being selected 1st Team All Conference. He averaged 10.3 points per game and eight rebounds per game. Hightower also made 60 percent of his shots from the field.

"It was a pleasure coaching these young men," Futrell said. "Due to their hard work and perseverance they were able to accomplish some great things and helped build a great future for Wilberforce athletics," he added.

There were also honors on the Lady Bulldogs squad. Two team members of the Lady Bulldogs were nominated as scholar athletes by the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics.

Danielle Lewis, a 5-foot-5 senior from Toledo, OH and Angelica Rucker, a five-foot-seven senior from Shawnee, KS were both honored for their academic accomplishments. Student athletes must maintain a 3.5 grade point average to qualify for the scholar athlete designation.

"These young ladies have been shining examples of what we want all of our student athletes to achieve," said Futrell.




